FAB PARIS France's premier fair for fine art & antiques unveils details of its third edition

French Treasures and Millennia of Art History to go on view at the landmark Grand Palais from 22 until 27 November 2024

This autumn, FAB Paris returns for a highly-anticipated third edition. Running from 22 until 27 November 2024, France's premier fair for fine art & antiques, will see 100 internationally-renowned art and antique dealers convene under the iconic glass dome of the newly-restored Grand Palais – the fair's permanent venue.

A fabulous ephemeral museum, the show will encompass no fewer than **20 disciplines** in the fields of fine art, furniture, antiquities and jewellery. From an Ancient Egyptian head formerly in the collection of Coco Chanel to furniture that once graced the *salons* of Versailles, the selection will chart millennia of human creativity. Also on view will be a rollcall of the greatest names in art history, including Pieter Brueghel the Younger, Albert Dürer, Auguste Rodin, Renoir and Pablo Picasso. *A selection of highlights is available on p.6*.

A GLANCE AT THIS YEAR'S EXHIBITORS

Modern & Contemporary Art

Modern and contemporary art will feature strongly in this year's edition, with leading international galleries participating for the first time, including the London dealers **Richard Green** and **Gallery Stern-Pissarro**, run by the descendants of the impressionist master Camille Pissarro; the international contemporary art gallery **Almine Rech; Wienerroither & Kohlbacher**, Viennese experts in Austrian and classical modernism; **Jean-François Cazeau** whose Parisian gallery focuses on Impressionist & Modern Art; **Maurice Verbaet**, known for its remarkable collection of Belgian post-war art; and **Galerie Traits Noirs** which focuses on masters of 20th century. Also joining will be French contemporary art galleries, **8+4** and **David Pluskwa**.

The selection will also be highlighted by the participation of **Rosenberg & Co**, the New York gallery led by Marianne Rosenberg (granddaughter of legendary art dealer Paul Rosenberg), **Helene Bailly**, **Applicat-Prazan**, **Galerie de la Béraudière**, **La Présidence**, **Antoine Laurentin** and **Taménaga** which was the first gallery in Japan to introduce European Modern Art in 1969.

Old Masters and 19th-century Painting

Old masters and 19th-century painting have traditionally been a *forte* at the fair and its founding entities - *Fine Arts Paris* and *La Biennale des Antiquaires*. A roster of renowned specialists, including **Didier Aaron**, **De Bayser**, **De Jonckheere**, **Descours**, **Laocoon Gallery/W. Apolloni**, **Ary Jan**, **Terrades**, **Leegenhoek**, **Ana Chiclana**, **Pelgrims de Bigard** and **Florence de Voldère**, will return. They will be joined by the esteemed New York dealer

Adam Williams, London dealer Richard Green, Rome gallerist Miriam Di Penta, Flemish and Dutch painting specialist Franck Anelli, London Old Masters drawing specialist Stephen Ongpin and Samuel Drylewicz who focuses on late 19th & early 20th century painting.

Furniture & Decorative Arts

Testament to France's long tradition of furniture-making and decorative arts, the fair will bring together illustrious Parisian antique dealers, including **Steinitz**, **Léage**, **Pascal Izarn** and **Michel Giraud**. Participating for the first time will be **Röbbig München**, German experts in 18th-century European courtly art and Meissen porcelain.

20th-century and contemporary design will also be on offer. **Alain Marcelpoil**, the specialist of avant-garde cabinetmaker André Sornay will be accompanied by three new exhibitors: **Robertaebasta**, the Milan-born dealership specialising in 20th-century design and decorative arts, **Jousse Entreprise**, an authority in mid-20th century architects' furniture and **Maison Rapin** which will showcase decorative pieces by Robert Goossens (1927-2016) – the goldsmith famous for designing jewellery for Coco Chanel, Balenciaga and Yves Saint Laurent in the 1950s.

Sculpture

Some of the most discerning sculpture specialists will return, including **Xavier Eeckhout**, **Sismann, Trebosc & Van Lelyveld, Univers du Bronze** and **Desmet Fine Art**, the Brussels gallery specialised in classical sculpture. Participating for the first time will be 19th and 20th-century sculpture expert **Nicolas Bourriaud**.

A Journey through time and continents

The section dedicated to Antiquities will feature Ancient Egypt specialist Cybèle, Paris dealer Antoine Tarantino. Newcomers will include the London-based dealership Arteas and David Ghezelbash who will present archaeological works from the ancient Mediterranean basin.

Tribal Art galleries **Schoffel de Fabry**, **Yann Ferrandin** and **Monbrison** will be joined by specialists in the art from the Orient, Islamic and Indian worlds, including London gallery **Kent Antiques**, Paris three-generation dealer **Kevorkian** and **Tenzing Asian Art**, a trailblazer in the discipline of Himalayan Art.

Japanese art will also take centre stage. Tokyo leading contemporary art gallery A Lighthouse called Kanata, will debut alongside Jean-Christophe Charbonnier, an authority in Samurai armours and the young Parisian female duo Louis & Sack who will present a selection of works by Japanese artists from the "New Ecole de Paris". Other notable disciplines featured include rare books, antique fames, manuscripts and jewellery.

YOUNG TALENTS

Following the success of the first "Young Talents" section last year, six art dealers – aged between 29 and 35 - have been given the opportunity to exhibit at the fair. Each of them has been in business for less than five years and will present two artworks estimated at less than €25,000. The selected works will go on show in a dedicated stand designed by **Victor Bonnivard**, the young French interior designer known for his high-profile renovations of historic buildings.

This year's new talents include the Kansas City-based dealer in 19th-century French furniture **Cole Myers**; former ballet dancer turned drawing specialist, **Louis Marteau**; Belgian design rising star **Giulia de Jonckheere** (b. 1995); Brussels-based **Jonathan F. Kugel** who hails from a 6th-generation family of Parisian antique dealers and will showcase a 2-meter-long drawing by contemporary artist Joel Person; Art Nouveau and Symbolism specialist **Caroline Thieffry** and **Léo Lefèvre** who focuses on 19th- and 20th- century painting and drawing.

Louis de Bayser, President of FAB Paris said: "FAB Paris was created by art dealers with the key mission to support the fine art and antique trade. Cultivating a new generation of art dealers is essential to the vitality of the market and we hope that this initiative will provide young talents from far and near with an opportunity to exhibit in a legendary venue, alongside some of today's most eminent and experienced gallerists".

SPECIAL EXHIBITION

A further highlight of this edition will be an unprecedented exhibition dedicated to the legendary collection of **Villa Ephrussi de Rothschild**, the magnificent palace built by Béatrice de Rothschild (1864-1934) on the French Riviera. Coinciding with the 160th anniversary of the birth of Béatrice de Rothschild (1864-1934), the show will include 50 pieces from the museum's storied collection, many of which boast royal provenance and have never been shown publicly. The exhibition will be designed by **Jacques Garcia**, creator of the world's most exuberant interiors.

A RICH PROGRAMME OF EVENTS

Building on its longstanding relationships with France's most renowned museums and private institutions, FAB Paris will host a programme of exclusive visits in collaboration with the Petit Palais, Musée Guimet, Opéra Garnier, Ecole des Arts Joailliers, Maison de Victor Hugo, Musée Yves Saint Laurent, Musée Bourdelle, MAD, Fondation Louis Vuitton, Musée de Cluny and Musée Cognacq-Jay.

Other high points of the week will be the traditional inaugural gala dinner, a panel discussion on French and US museums' acquisition policies and a concert organised by the foundation of virtuoso cellist **Gautier Capuçon**. The fair has also partnered with **Philanthropic ArsNova** (Champagne Taittinger's Endowment Fund) and the **Fondation pour la Sauvegarde de l'Art français** (Foundation for the safeguard of French Art) in support of their charitable initiatives.





150 YEARS OF IMPRESSIONISM

THE GOÛT ROTHSCHILD IN THE SPOTLIGHT

FAB Paris' venerable predecessor, the *Biennale des Antiquaires*, has long epitomised the "goût Rothschild", a term coined to describe the sumptuous and erudite collecting style that was embraced across generations of the famous European dynasty since the 19th century. Anchored by global curiosities, French decorative arts and Old Master paintings, the Rothschild aesthetic was distinguished by an unmatched sense of sophistication and sought to replicate the "treasure house" allure of Europe's grandest homes.

This year at FAB Paris, the "Rothschild taste" will once again take centre stage, with the participation of some of the world's most respected dealers of French decorative arts, including Steinitz, Léage, Brun Fine Art, Pascal Izarn and Trebosc + Van Lelyveld.

The fair will also host a special exhibition dedication to the **Villa Ephrussi de Rothschild**, the magnificent palace built by Béatrice de Rothschild (1864-1934) on the French Riviera. The show will include 50 pieces from the museum's storied collection, many of which boast royal provenance and have never been shown publicly.

The exhibition will be designed by **Jacques Garcia**, the world-renowned French interior designer who redecorated Versailles and the Louvre, among other high-profile projects.

SURREALISM AT 100

A century on from André Breton's founding manifesto, Surrealism still has the power to disrupt and inspire. In addition to prominent names, such as **Paul Delvaux**, **Max Ernst, Joan Miró, Paul Eluard** and **Alexander Calder**, the selection of works presented at FAB Paris will shine the spotlight on lesser-known members of the movement, as well as contemporary artists influenced by the surrealist aesthetic.


Parisian gallerist **Françoise Livinec** will present works by friends and family of André Breton, including his wife **Jacqueline Lamba**, his son-in-law **Yves Elléouët** and his friend **Alexander Calder** – all coming from the collection of Aube Elléouët-Breton, daughter of Breton and wife of Elléouët.

French dealer **Jean-François Cazeau** will showcase a series of works by **André Masson** (1896-1987), one of the greatest exponents of automatic drawing and sand pictures who has just been given a retrospective at the Centre Pompidou Metz.

Testament to the enduring influence of surrealism, works by British pop artist Clive Baber (Whitford Fine Art) and young French artist Claire Trotignon who creates fictional landscapes with fragments of antique prints (Galerie 8+4) will also go on view.



MAESTRAS

Famous, Forgotten, Rediscovered

The show will feature a range of women artists from the 18th century to today. Among them are will be **Anne Vallayer-Coster** (1744-1818), painter to Queen Marie Antoinette, best known for her still lifes (Richard Green) and **Rosalba Carriera** (1673-1757), the self-taught Italian pastel portraitist who was feted by royals throughout Europe (Brun Fine Art, Ratton Ladrière). Also on view on the booth of Galerie Ratton-Ladrière will be works by classicist painter **Marie-Victoire Lemoine** (1754-1820) and **Félicie de Fauveau** (1801-1886), the first French female sculptor to live off her art and whom Stendhal used to call the "new Canova". Fabienne Fiacre will present two works by **Louise-Joséphine Sarazin de Belmont** (1790–1871), the open-air landscapist who travelled unchaperoned most of her life.

20th-century artists will also be present, led by architect and designer Charlotte Perriand (1903-1999) (Jousse Entreprise), Parisian avant-garde artist **Marie Laurencin** (1883-1956) who has her own museum in Japan (Taménaga), abstract painter **Geneviève Asse** (1923-2021) (Laurentin) and **Judit Reigl** (1923-2020), the Hungarian artist who subverted ideas around gender in her large, gestural paintings (Dina Vierny, Jean-François Cazeau).





JAPANMANIA

France and Japan have a long history of cultural exchange going back to the 16th century. The discovery of Japanese aesthetics and craftsmanship following the reopening of the Nippon Empire in 1853-54 radically transformed Europe's visual culture. *Japonisme* became one of France's most enduring artistic movements, profoundly influencing Impressionism, Art Nouveau and Art Deco. Similarly, in the 1920s and then the post-war era, many Japanese artists travelled to France and took an active part in the Parisian art scene.

Testament to this mutual fascination, Japanese Art will feature strongly in this edition of FAB Paris. In addition to **Jean-Christophe Charbonnier**, world-renowned authority in Japanese armours, **Michel Giraud** will present a low screen by Japanese cabinetmaker Kichizô Inagaki, designed for a joint exhibition with his friend August Rodin.

Tokyo contemporary art gallery **A Lighthouse called Kanata** unveil minimalist works by today's greatest Japanese artists, including sculptor **Kan Yasuda**, the last student of Isamu Noguchi.

The Parisian female duo **Louis & Sack** who focuses on post-war Japanese artists from the 'Nouvelle Ecole de Paris' will return, joined by the Tokyo and Paris-based gallery, **Taménaga** which was the first gallery in Japan to introduce European Modern Art in 1969.

Kichizô Inagaki revolutionised the art of wooden pedestal. Following his arrival in Paris in 1906, he was quickly noticed by antique dealers and artists, including Rodin, who commissioned pedestals for their sculptures. In the 1920s, he also designed furniture for Eileen Gray

This low screen is one of the rare known furniture pieces by the Japanese artist. Combining Inagaki's unique wood technique, Japanese tradition and the creative spirit of Paris at the turn of the century, it was meant to be shown in *De Pierres et de Bois*, a joint exhibition he and friend Rodin were preparing in 1914 but which never happened because of WWI.





Ceramic production in 12th-century Syria and Iran saw the further experimentation of stonepaste. This innovative ceramic medium - also called fritware - is made of finely ground quartz (obtained from pounding pebbles or sand), which is then mixed with small amounts of liquefied glass (glass frit or glass fragments) and refined clay.



THE BEHEMOTHS OF ART HISTORY

The rhinoceros that inspired Dürer's print was given by an Indian sultan to King Manuel of Portugal in 1515 and was the first to arrive in Europe since Roman times. The arrival of the animal – at the time considered as a quasimythical creature - caused a sensation, fuelled by the many thousands of impressions of Dürer's drawing which were circulated across Europe.

French goldsmith Robert Goossens is well known for his jewellery and collaboration with Coco Chanel, Yves Saint Laurent and Balenciaga. What is less known is that as part as his collaboration with Chanel in the late 1950s and thereafter with YSL, Goossens started to create what he called "jewels for interiors" - objects, mirrors, chandeliers, and furniture adorned with pyrites, rock crystal, and coral - which he kept producing until the 1980s.

ABOUT FAB PARIS

FAB Paris (formerly known as Fine Arts Paris & La Biennale) was created in February 2022, in a move to combine the synergies, expertise and global reputation of two highly regarded French art fairs: *La Biennale des Antiquaires* and *Fine Arts Paris*. Following the first two editions (at the Carousel du Louvre in 2022 and the Grand Palais Ephémère in 2023), the fair has taken up residence at the newly-restored Grand Palais – the fair's permanent venue.

The world-renowned *Biennale des Antiquaires* was founded in 1956 by André Malraux, the famed novelist and France's Minister of Cultural Affairs. Over the following six decades, the event, hosted at the Grand Palais, had become one of the world's grandest decorative arts fairs and one of the most important cultural events in Paris. Focusing on museum-quality paintings, drawings and sculptures, *Fine Arts Paris* started as a boutique offering of 34 exhibitors in 2017. By 2021, under the leadership of its President Louis de Bayser, the salon had grown to include 55 leading art dealers.

FAB Paris is run by the **Agence d'Événements Culturels** (AEC), which also runs the *Salon du Dessin* and was previously in charge of *Fine Arts Paris* and *Paris Tableau*. More information on <u>fabparis.com</u>
